



A farce called 'peace plan'

President Donald Trump has finally unveiled his much-touted 20-point plan for a ceasefire in Gaza, which he describes as a landmark deal to end two years of a devastating war. But in reality, it's a document of surrender for the against a brutal occupation. It has sanctified the genocide, carried out by the Zionist forces, which has killed tens of thousands of occupied land.

În fact, it's a declaraaccused of war crimes. Former British prime minister Tony Blair and Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner have played a key role in preparing the socalled peace plan. Kushner was also the driving force behind the Abraham Accords during Trump's first term as president.

For his part, Blair, as prime minister, had actively supported the Americanled invasion and occupation of Iraq based on false claims of the regime possessing and Muslim-majority coun-

tion. Many in the Arab world and also in Britain regard him as a war criminal, too.

Unsurprisingly, Israel immediately accepted the latest American plan. Standing, alongside Trump at a press conference, Israel's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, who has been accused of committing crimes against humanity by the International Criminal Court, had nothing but praise for the US leader who said, "Israel would have my full backing to finish the job of destroying the threat of Hamas". The plan has justifiably been termed as the Trump-Netanyahu plan' to ensure Israel's military dominance in the region.

have already given their approval to the plan which, many analysts contend, would place Gaza under colonial rule.

There is only a vague mention of the possibility of an independent Palestinian entity in the unforeseeable future. Israel has already rejected the idea of a separate Palestinian state. Though Israel has been stopped from annexing the West Bank, some hard-line Israeli ministers have threatened to do so. According to the

Gaza plan, the war would immediately end after the exchange of prisoners. Israeli forces are only supposed to withdraw to the agreed-upon line to prepare for hostage release. During this time, "all military operations, including aerial and artillery bombardment, will be suspended, and battle lines will remain frozen until conditions are met for the complete staged withdrawal'

Also, "Once all hostages are returned, Hamas members who commit to peaceful coexistence and to decommission their weapons will be given amnesty. Members of Hamas who

provided safe passage to receiving countries". This is more or less a call for a complete surrender of the group, which heads the Pales-tinian resistance against the Zionist occupa-

There would be no role for Hamas in the post-war administrative set-up in the occupied territory. Even the Palestinian Authority, which controls the occupied West Bank, has not been assigned any role in the post war set-up. That practically brings to an end the concept of a Palestinian state. Palestinian groups have been kept out of the post war set-up altogether.

However, the complete implementation even of the "staged withdrawal" of the occupying forces remains uncertain given Israel's bellicosity. In fact, the plan has further emboldened Israel, which is being ruled by extreme right groups that openly advocate for the establishment of a 'Greater Israel', with no place for a separate Palestinian state.

According to the American plan, "Gaza will be governed under the temporary transitional goverlitical Pale-stinian committee" under the supervision of a new international transitional body, the 'Board of Peace', to be headed by Trump and others including Blair. That would practically give America control of the occupied territory for an indefinite period. Some analysts believe the proposal is not very different from Trump's suggestion in February to put Gaza un-

der US control so that the

enclave could be turned

into a Riviera. Meanwhile, Trump administration will work with Arab and international partners to develop a temporary 'International Stabilisation Force' to be deployed in Gaza. Besides, its main job of maintaining law and order, the ISF will also train and provide support to newly formed Palestinian police forces in

The ISF would comrise troops from various Muslim countries. According to some reports, the main bulk of the troops would come from Indonesia and Pakistan, the two largest Muslim-majority nations. It may be the reason for Trump's adulation of Pakistan's prime minister and army chief. It is evident that Pakistan was taken into confidence on the plan by Trump.

The Israeli security forces will stay in the enclave till the ISF has taken control, but would still have "a security perimeter presence ... until Gaza is properly secure from any resurgent terror threat".

Surely the ceasefire will end the relentless killing and destruction perpetrated by the Israeli forces and allow in much-needed humanitarian aid. But the main question is whether the American plan can establish long-term peace in the region without formally recognising the right of the Palestinian people to an independent state.

Hamas might be disarmed but what about those in Gaza who lost family members to the genocide that has been raging for two years now? The anger of a whole generation of Palestinians, who have only seen death and hunger, will not be contained. The controversial plan will lead to greater discontent and uncertainty. Palestinians have rightly rejected the American plan as a farce.

At the same time, other health and social causes benefit from clearer metrics, stronger advocacy and established global campaigns, while cultural attitudes still frame mental illness as a private or

public health priority. The evidence for investment, however, could

in global health. The WHO and World Bank estimate that every dollar spent on mental health yields four dollars in improved health and productivity. Beyond this measurable return, the ripple effects are even healthier greater: workforces, better educational outcomes, reduced healthcare costs from untreated physical conditions and fewer burdens on social services and systems. Cru-cially, supporting mental health also has intergenerational benefits, improving child development and breaking cycles of disadvantage.

If we are to disrupt this pattern, mental health giving must be reframed as compelling, urgent and aspirational. That means creating national visibility bassadors so that giving towards mental health feels impactful and worthy.

A poet's odyssey Mahir Ali

Shortly after the British poet laureate Ted Hughes rumoured that the shortlist for a successor included Tony Harrison. Unlikely as that might chosen to "hymn the Crown's demise" in A Celebratory Ode on the Abdication of King Charles III, Harrison was

He pre-empted the dishonour by publishing Laureate's Block, flaying the monarchy and its toadying enablers, declaring he wished to remain sentiments, unsubtly expressed, earned him the wrath of a cultural establishment that had hitherto tended to acknowledge, if not always hail, this poet's exceptional erudition and eloquence.

I first encountered Tony Harrison, who died last Friday at 88, in the 1991 when the newspaper published A Cold Coming, a scathing critique of that year's Iraq war (and, in fact, all such conflicts) delivered in rhyming verse. The poet imagines himself interviewing a grotesquely charred Iraqi soldier (whose image was indeed published worldwide) reflecting on the life he

The WHO predicts that by 2050, the number of individuals aged 60 and above will double, reaching 2.1 billion. In Pakistan, the population of older adults is expected to surge from 11.3 million in 2017 to over 43.3m by 2050. The focus on the elderly in Pakistan has tended to be on the burden and dependency associated with old age, overlooking the aspirations of older adults and the invaluable role they play in eastern societies.

Older Pakistanis are eager for recognition of their sociocultural rights, appreciation for their contribution and support to stay as active participants in national progress. They have a wealth of knowledge, skills and life experiences. Sadly, our systems fail to engage them meaningfully, leading to premature retirement and significant loss of human resource.

Strengthening healthcare for older adults is a priority. Our healthcare system has few geriatric specialists, ingeriatric specialised nurses, and relevant hea-lthcare. While health insurance sche-mes offer a starting point, initiatives tailored to geriatric care to promote social inclusion must be implemented. Healthcare ser-

through existing healthcare facilities should be enhanced, with selected developing areas specialised centres as models. Primary healthcare units, too, need needs of our ageing seg-

Lack of financial security is a major hurdle. About 3m people are receiving pension through the EOBI, with a similar number benefiting from government sector pension schemes. Yet, the coverage for those over retirement age is just between 7-10 per cent, revealing a large gap in financial safety and highlighting the urgent need for enhanced social security measures such as targeted cash transfer programmes for older adults living in pov-

Public spaces need to prioritise age-friendly infrastructure design, with major projects focusing on resting areas, basic medical support along highways, public transport that offers reserved seating for older people, preg-nant women and the disabled with clearly marked symbols, and urban planning that includes safe sidewalks, public seating and barrier-free building designs.

Promoting social inclusion also means ending age discrimination in Pakistan. Job policies should combat age biases and encourage workplaces that appreciate the contributions of people from all age groups. Educational institutions can be tapped for learning programmes where older adults can share their wisdom, skills and cultural experiences with younger generations. This will help preserve our cultural heritage and engage senior citizens in meaningful roles which also allow them to earn a livelihood.

On petrol, the freight margin has been raised by Rs2.04 per litre, bringing the total to Rs8.69 per litre.

For kerosene, the margin has been revised to Rs7.83 per litre after an increase of 2 paisa.

In addition, the government continues to impose heavy levies on petroleum products.

Gold price surges by Rs3,500 to Rs410,278 per tola

ISLAMABAD (APP): The price of 24 karat gold witnessed an increase of Rs3,500 on Wednesday and was sold all time high at Rs410,278 per tola as compared to Rs406,778 on the last trading day. According to All Sindh Sarafa Jewellers Association, the price of 10 grams of 24 karat gold also increased by Rs3,001 to Rs351,747 from Rs348.746 whereas 10 grams of 22 karat gold went up to Rs322,446 from Rs319,695, showing a rise of Rs2,751. In the international market, the price of gold increased by \$35 and was traded at \$3,890 against its sale at \$3,855, the association reported

LAHORE (APP): Ambassador of Uzbekistan to Pakistan Alisher Tukhtaev has said that there is immense potential for enhancing bilateral trade and investment, particularly in the textile sector, through joint ventures and greater cooperation between the two countries.

Hamas wants to amend disarmament clause in Trump plan

Monitoring Desk DOHA: Hamas officials want amendments to clauses on disarmament in US President Donald Trump's Gaza peace plan, a Palestinian source close to the group's leadership told AFP on Wednesday.

Hamas negotiators held discussions Tuesday with Turkish, Egyptian and Qatari officials in Doha, the source said, requesting anonymity to discuss sensitive matters and adding the group needed "two or three days at most" to respond.

Trump's plan, backed by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, calls for a ceasefire, the release of hostages by Hamas within 72 hours, the group's disarmament and a gradual Israeli withdrawal from Gaza.



Poland to extend German border checks until April

Monitoring Desk WARSAW: Poland on Wednesday said it would extend temporary checks along its borders with Germany and Lithuania by a further six months, until

April 4 next year. Border checks had been reinstated in July, with the Polish government justifying the measure as a way to combat irregular migration. Warsaw had accused Berlin, which reintroduced checks along their shared border in 2023, of sending migrants back toward Poland — an accusation Ger-

many denies.
"We are extending border controls with Germany and Lithuania to monitor the migration route originating from the

Baltic states, passing through Poland, and leading to Western Europe,' Polish Interior Minister Marcin Kierwinski stated in a statement. "We are intercepting individuals attempting to illegally transport migrants to the West," he said. The minister also referenced "persistent migratory pressure" on the border with Belarus.

WARSAW: A Polish court decided on Wednesday that the Ukrainian diver wanted by Berlin over his alleged involvement in explosions which damaged the Nord Stream gas pipeline, must be kept in custody while a decision is made on whether to transfer him to Germany. Described by both Moscow and the West as an act of sabotage, the explosions marked an escalation in the Ukraine conflict and squeezed energy supplies on the continent. No one has taken responsibility for the blasts and Ukraine has denied any role.

VIENNA: An Austrian court on Wednesday convicted a woman who was repatriated from a Syrian detention camp for having been part of the Daesh group, handing her a twoyear suspended jail sen-

Since Daesh was ousted from its self-declared "caliphate" in 2019 the repatriation of family members of fighters who were either captured or killed has been a thorny issue for European countries.

Maria G., now 28, was brought back from Syria with her two sons in March and has remained free since her return, but was facing charges of being part of a terrorist group and a criminal organization. At her trial on Wednesday in a court in the city of Salzburg, Maria G. pleaded guilty to both charges and "fully confessed," court spokes-woman Christina Bayrhammer told AFP.

Prosecutors said they found no evidence of other crimes committed by Maria G. beyond her joining Daesh.

The court handed her a "suspended jail sentence of 24 months," which she accepted, describing it as "another chance in life," Bayrhammer said.

The court ruled that she will have to continue undergoing psychological counselling and a deradicalization program.

US offers security guarantees to Qatar after Israel strikes: White House

WASHINGTON (AFP/ APP): The United States will regard "any armed attack" on Qatari territory as a threat to Washington and will provide the Gulf Arab state with security guarantees, the White House said, after an Israeli strike on the country last month.

"In light of the continuing threats to the State of Qatar posed by foreign aggression, it is the policy of the United States to guarantee the security and territorial integrity of the State of Qatar against external attack," said an Executive Order signed by US President Donald Trump on Monday. In the event of an attack on Qatar, the United States will "take all lawful and appropriate mea-sures—including diplo-matic, economic, and, if us Central Command.

necessary, military—to defend the interests of the United States and of the State of Qatar and to restore peace and stability," the order said.

The agreement comes after an Israeli strike on the key US regional ally on September 9. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu called Qatar's prime minister from the White House on Monday, apologizing for strikes and promising not to do so again, the United States said. Netanyahu was in Washington to meet Trump, and had until then been defiant since ordering the September 9 strikes. Qatar is a key US ally in the Gulf and hosts the largest US military base in the region at al-Udeid which also includes a regional headquarters for elements of

Zelensky and UN atomic agency head warn of heightened risk at huge Ukrainian nuclear plant

Monitoring Desk KYIV: Ukraine's president and the UN nuclear agency

head are sounding the alarm about increased safety risks at the Russia-occupied Zaporizhzhia Nuclear Power Plant in southern Ukraine, which lost its external power supply more than a week ago as the war raged around it. Emergency diesel generators are providing power for crucial cooling systems for the facility's six shutdown reactors and spent fuel, and there is no immediate danger to Europe's biggest nuclear plant, according to International Atomic Energy Agency Director-General Rafael Mariano Grossi.

But "it is clearly not a sustainable situation in terms of nuclear safety," he said. The backup generators have never needed to run for so long, according to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky. "The generators and the plant were not designed for this,"

Zelensky said late Tuesday, describing the situation as "critical." Zaporizhzhia is one of the 10 biggest nuclear plants in the world, and its fate amid the fighting has caused fears of a potential nuclear catastrophe. Russian forces seized it days after the full-scale invasion of neighboring Ukraine began on Feb. 24, 2022.

The Vienna-based IAEA has been walking a tightrope in the war, eager to maintain access to nuclear facilities and issuing warnings about the dangers without angering either side. Ukraine has four nuclear plants, though Zaporizhzhia is the only one in Russian hands. Grossi Zaporizhzhia's emergency

Kyrgyz leader seeks death penalty for worst crimes against children and women

Monitoring Desk BISHKEK: Kyrgyzstan's populist President Sadyr Japarov has ordered the drafting of a bill to reinstate the death penalty for the most serious crimes against

children and women. His move followed the killing of a 17-year-old girl, which sparked public outrage in the mountainous former Soviet republic of around seven million people. Her body was found on September 27, and a suspect has been detained. Kyrgyzstan was ranked the most dangerous country for women in Central Asia in the previous two years, according to the global Women, Peace and Security Index.

According to the presidential administration, the proposed legislation would reinstate the death penalty for rape of children and for rape followed by murder of women. Kyrgyzstan has observed a moratorium on the death penalty since 2007, meaning its return would require major constitutional and legal changes.

In a post on Facebook, Japarov's press secretary

said that the president was backing the bill in response to the murder of the girl, who has been named only as Aisuluu. He said that Japarov

believed that "crimes against women and children must not go unpunished."The country

holds a parliamentary election on November 30, with parties loyal to Japarov aiming to stay dominant.

Since coming to power on a wave of protests in 2020, Japarov has tightened his grip on Kyrgyzstan, traditionally Central Asia's most democratic country, where three presidents have been ousted by mass demonstrations since independence in 1991. According to Kyrgyz independent media outlet Kloop, 20-30 gender-targeted femicides are recorded annually, with overall 1,109 women killed between 2010 and 2023. According to rights group Amnesty International, 113 nations had abolished the death penalty by the end of 2024 with 1,518 executions recorded worldwide that year, mostly in China,

Madagascar protesters demand president's resignation in fifth day of rallies

ANTANANARIVO: Hundreds of protesters across Madagascar demanded the resignation of President Andry Rajoelina on Wednesday, taking to the streets for a fifth day of demonstrations that have shaken the government, local television broadcasts showed.

Spurred by the socalled youth-led "Gen Z" protests in Kenya and Nepal, the demonstrations have been the largest the Indian Ocean island has seen in years, and the most serious challenge Rajoelina has faced since his re-election in 2023. The protests initially started in Antananarivo last week over nationwide water shortages and power blackouts but have since spread across the island, prompting Rajoelina to dissolve the government late on Monday. His move failed to assuage public anger. A message on the protest movement's Facebook page called for Rajoelina's resignation as well as the disso-

lution of the election commission, the senate and the country's top court.

testers took to the streets in the capital and towns including Toliara, 925 km (575 miles) south of Antananarivo, chanting 'get out" and waving flags and banners with the words "Rajoelina Out," footage broadcast by privately-owned Radio Télévision Siteny showed.

They were escorted by security forces in vehicles, and other protesters in rickshaws, the footage showed. A government spokesperson did not respond to Reuters requests for comment, however the president's spokesperson Lova Ranoromaro said on social media that property had been destroyed and homes looted.

Trump praises Pakistan for recognizing his efforts to stop conflict with India

WASHINGTON (APP): U.S. President Donald Trump Tuesday said he called both Pakistan and India to stop the war between the two nucleararmed countries and again praised the Pakistani leadership for acknowledging that by doing so he saved millions of lives.

"India and Pakistan were going at it. I called them both... They had just shot down seven planes... I said, if you do this, there's not going to be any trade, and I stopped the war. It was raging for four days," he told American military commanders at Quantico, Virginia, near Washington DC.

Trump said he leveraged U.S. trade to end the war that the two countries fought between May 7 and 10, engaging in one of the largest aerial combats in modern warfare.
