Pak signs crypto deal linked to Trump family to explore stablecoin payments

Rapid growth of digital payments, financial innovation, essential parts of Pakistan's expanding digital economy: PM

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has signed an agreement with a company affiliated with World Liberty Financial, the main crypto business linked to the family of US President Donald Trump, to explore the use of a dollar linked stablecoin for cross border payments, the government said on Wednesday.

The Pakistan Virtual Asset Regulatory Authority said it had signed a memorandum of understanding with SC Financial Technologies, which it described as an affiliated entity of World Liberty Financial. The agreement will allow dialogue and technical engagement around "emerging digital payment architectures".

The development marks one of the first publicly announced partnerships between World Liberty Financial, a crypto based finance platform launched in September 2024, and a sovereign state. It also comes amid warming ties between Pakistan and the United States.

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Muhammad

Shehbaz Sharif, Wednesday, said that the rapidly growing pace of digital payments and financial innovation were essential parts of Pakistan's rapidly expanding digital economy.

A delegation of World Liberty Financial USA led by Zachary Witkoff, Chief Executive Officer called on him, PM Office Media Wing said in a press release. The prime minister shared his vision for digital Pakistan aimed at increased connectivity, access, transparency and openness for the citizens.

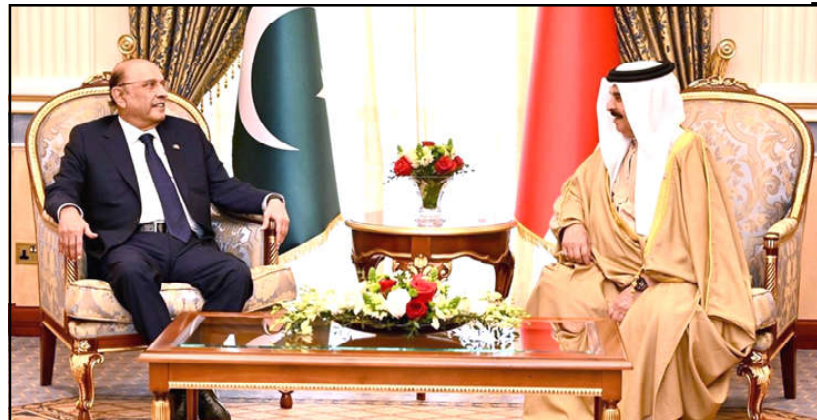

Says education, health among top priorities of govt

QUETTA: Chief Minister Balochistan Mir Sarfraz Bugti has said that sustainable development in the province hinges on strengthening human resources, stressing that long-term progress cannot be achieved without major investment in education, health and social welfare sectors.

He made these remarks during a meeting with United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) Country Representative Luay Shabaneh, in which population management, maternal and child health, youth and women's welfare, and data-driven policymaking

were discussed.

ISLAMABAD (INP): Pakistan has denounced Indian National Security Adviser Ajit Doval's remarks of "avenging history" and creating a strong India.

Bilawal accuses 'some forces' of rolling back provincial powers, shifting resources to Islamabad

THARPARKAR (INP): Pakistan Peoples Party Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari on Wednesday accused "some forces" of deliberately promoting a narrative that Sindh and smaller provinces had failed to perform, warning that the campaign was aimed at justifying the rollback of provincial powers and resources to Islamabad.

Speaking at the inauguration of the Thar Institute of Engineering, Science and Technology — affiliated with NED University of Engineering and Technology — on the Mithi-Islamkot Road in Tharparkar, Bilawal said development in Tharparkar is the strongest response to what he described as a "deliberate conspiracy" aimed at rolling back the constitutional rights, authority and resources of provinces.

"The biggest rebuttal to this false narrative is

Tharparkar itself," he said, pointing to the contrast between the district's conditions before 2008 and the situation following the 18th Constitutional Amendment.

Bilawal said the Pakistan Peoples Party believed in pro-poor and people-centric governance, adding that his party was willing to compete with other provinces and governments in education, health and development. "No one can defeat the people of Sindh in this competition," he said.

He stressed that development in Tharparkar and in all four provinces was essential for Pakistan's overall progress, rejecting the idea that provincial development could only flow from the federal capital.

Referring to Thar coal, Bilawal said the resource belonged to the people of

The petitions contended that Sui Southern Gas Company (SSGC) had imposed the capital tariff on industries in February 2025, resulting in a significant increase in production costs and causing severe financial difficulties for industrial units. Pak jets in demand worldwide after military wins: PM Shehbaz

Announces expedited Karachi-Chaman highway overhaul, major development initiatives for Balochistan

ISLAMABAD (APP): Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Wednesday announced that work on the long-awaited Karachi-Chaman highway, often referred to as a bloody road due to frequent accidents, has formally begun and will now be completed within a year instead of the originally planned two years.

Addressing the federal cabinet members before the meeting, the prime minister said he had recently visited Quetta, where the foundation stone of the nearly 850-kilometre highway was laid.

He said the Ministry

of Communications had proposed a two-year completion timeline, but he had directed that the project be finished within one year. "The project will cost approximately Rs400 billion, to be fully financed by the federal government," he said.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif recalled that around six months ago, when international oil and petroleum prices were plummeting, the government had decided to retain prices domestically. He said the savings generated from that decision were

Australia-Pakistan three T20Is series to begin from January 29 at Gaddafi

LAHORE (APP): The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) has confirmed Australia's T20I tour of Pakistan later this month beginning from January 29 at the Gaddafi Stadium here.

The three-match T20I series scheduled to be played at the Gaddafi Stadium will take place on 29, 31 January and 1 February.

The series will serve as crucial game time for both sides ahead of the all-important ICC Men's T20I World Cup 2026 in India and Sri Lanka where Pakistan are placed in Group A and Australia in Group B.

Australia's T20I squad will arrive in Lahore on Wednesday 28 January. The coin toss in all the three matches is set to take place at 5.30pm PKT with the first ball expected to be bowled at 6pm PKT.

This will also be Australia's third trip to Pakistan since March-April 2022, when they played a three-match Test and ODI series followed by a solitary T20I. They played three of their ICC Champions Trophy 2025 matches in the country as well.

Australia bagged a close three-wicket win in

the only T20I they played at the Gaddafi Stadium on 5 April 2022.

Expressing immense excitement in hosting Australia prior to the ICC mega event, COO PCB Sumair Ahmed Syed said "We are excited and look forward to hosting Australia for the three-match T20I series here in Lahore. The tour marks a blockbuster beginning of the year for Pakistan Cricket fans and I urge them to turn out in numbers during the series to support both the teams as they put final touches to their T20 World Cup preparations.

Tharparkar and described it as an asset comparable in scale to Saudi Arabia's oil reserves. He said repeated attempts by former prime minister Benazir Bhutto to utilise the coal reserves had been thwarted, delaying economic benefits for decades.

He said the use of Thar coal after 2008 had not only brought economic change to the region but had also contributed electricity to the national grid, benefiting industrial centres such as Faisalabad. "This is how a strong federation functions," he said.

Bilawal said economic activity in Thar had led to a parallel social transformation, with investments in healthcare resulting in a network of dispensaries, basic health units and hospitals across the district.

He cited the role of the Thar Foundation and a public-private partnership with Indus Hospital as examples of improved health services.

On education, he said the inauguration of the NED-affiliated institute fulfilled a long-standing demand of local youth.

He noted that classes began in 2019 in a government building and that the Sindh government had now inaugurated a dedicated campus, with a commitment to upgrade it into a full-fledged university by the end of its term.

Balochistan achieves record in textbook distribution for 2026 academic year

QUETTA (APP): The Balochistan Secondary Education Department has achieved a historic milestone in the publication and distribution of textbooks for the academic year 2026, setting new benchmarks in transparency, cost efficiency, and timely delivery.

According to an official handout, more than 50 percent of textbooks printed by the Balochistan Textbook Board have already been completed and transported from Lahore to Quetta. As in previous years, the textbooks will be distributed free of cost to students across all districts well ahead of the academic calendar.

In 2024-25, 9,309 million textbooks were printed at a cost of Rs1.086 billion. In contrast, for the academic year 2025-26, 11.5 million textbooks have been produced at a remarkably reduced cost of Rs883.1

million, highlighting unprecedented financial savings.

This year, textbooks were printed at a cost of Rs0.65 per page, the lowest among all provinces in the country. For comparison, the per-page printing cost in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa stood at Rs0.79.

According to the School Directorate, the demand for textbooks for the current academic year reached 11.5 million copies—an increase of 2.2 million compared to last year. This surge is primarily attributed to the revival of nearly 4,000 previously closed schools and the recruitment of more than 10,000 new teachers by the provincial government.

Under the National Curriculum 2022-23, new textbooks from primary to intermediate levels have been developed.

Blaming the IMF

The call by a panel, led by the planning and development minister, for “urgent ease of doing business reforms” to more than double export revenues to over \$60bn within three years is familiar rhetoric. The panel was formed by the prime minister to devise a strategy to exit the IMF programme once the current bailout facility ends at the end of next year. Its weeklong consultations with public and private sector stakeholders this month has apparently concluded that the current state of affairs cannot drive the 250m-strong population towards sustained progress due to cross-cutting constraints affecting all 20 priority export products and six export drivers.

There is nothing new in the diagnosis of the problems hampering economic and export growth, or the solutions suggested by the panel. If anything, both diagnosis and prescription echo past policy pronouncements that were never followed up. The constraints to economic and export growth — high, volatile energy costs, policy unpredictability, distorted taxation, logistics and trade facilitation bottlenecks, institutional fragmentation, regulatory burden, etc — cited by the panel are old hat. These have featured in donor and government reports and in media commentary.

The persistence of these structural problems shows that the challenge lies less in their diagnosis or analysis and more in the state’s capacity and willingness to deliver politically tough, rules-based reform. Against this backdrop, the panel’s implicitly holding restrictive IMF financing responsible for the government’s failure to aggressively implement reforms to return the economy to a sustainable growth path is an attempt to gloss over the state’s own dereliction of duty. Indeed, the IMF programme conditions and targets primarily aim for economic and fiscal stabilisation by imposing fiscal discipline rather than driving the economy towards growth.

However, the lender does not stop the government from undertaking or implementing reforms to restructure the economy or address stagnant growth. For example, it may demand that the authorities increase tax revenues as a ratio of GDP to slash the budget deficit — which should encourage the government to broaden the tax base. Nor does it ask them to cut development spending — instead of this, the government could reduce its own wasteful expenditure. Rather, the IMF — ideological and policy differences with its prescriptions aside — encourages the government to create a conducive business climate. The authorities are blaming the IMF programme for a sluggish, moribund economy to cover up their own incompetence, and obscure the ruling party’s unwillingness to dismantle the entrenched politically protected rent-seeking structures. Unless the government walks the talk on reform to create a rules-based economy, its rhetoric of doubling exports and breaking the proverbial begging bowl will remain a pipe dream.

The main boulevard in Gulberg was a long road with a wide and very green belt in the centre that ran from the Jail Road-Sherpao intersection all the way to Liberty market. The road on both sides of this green expanse was smallish and not that busy. But as the city grew, a decision was made to broaden the road and reduce the green belt, in order to accommodate the traffic. Since then, concrete has swallowed up most of the green. And the traffic continues to be a nightmare. The roads are wide and there are limited spots for U-turns or crossings but the traffic is far from manageable. Those who are forced to walk have to dash across between fast-moving cars and motorcycles.

It is hard to think of

any place in Lahore where the traffic is less chaotic, despite the flyovers and underpasses that have mushroomed all over the city, replacing the greenery in many cases. The canal, which once was the preferred spot for those who wanted to go for a ‘long drive’, is now a noisy, chaotic place, despite a series of underpasses. There was a time a drive next to the canal could be a relaxing affair as the city ended close to where Johar Town is. When an aunt of mine moved near Thokar Niaz Beg, it seemed so far away that a trip to her place was planned with as much fanfare as a day trip out of town. By now, of course, the city has spread far beyond what then seemed to be nowhere land.

The city has become much bigger, swallowing areas around it and the people travelling in and out and through the city have also increased; but decades later, no one seems to realise that widening

roads and installing flyovers doesn’t lead to a smooth traffic flow. In fact, more and bigger roads mean more cars and motorcycles. In the process, the sleepy green city of my childhood and youth has become ugly and concrete-ridden. For people such as myself who left Lahore some years ago, finding one’s way is at times impossible.

Readers may be wondering what the point of this trip down memory lane is. There is a point. I was reminded of the disappearance of the city of my childhood because of the debate raging in Islamabad where trees have been cut down in what is said to be large numbers and in more than one location. For once, so intense and consistent was the criticism that the government was forced to pay attention.

The authorities, which range from climate change to interior to CDA, insist that only paper mulberry trees (the cause of allergies) were

cut down and that each tree will be replaced by three saplings — as if a fully grown tree which is removed today can be adequately replaced by three saplings, which may or may not survive.

The larger context is not about how these trees were cut down but the mindset of what constitutes development and work across our political landscape. Since the 1990s, the political obsession is with building roads, broadening them, installing flyovers — a version of Dubai or Midwestern US. However, in the decades since, the world has moved on to a different version of urban living but as with our politics, we are stuck in a world and a vision that no longer works.

And so, ‘development’ continues to be pushed. In Islamabad, the greenery is being replaced by big roads, flyovers and underpasses with little thought for their need or their capacity to manage traffic. If it seems there

is a crossing where there is a wait and queues due to traffic lights, the ‘solution’ is to build an interchange or flyovers. No one realises that the wider roads in Lahore will eventually prove insufficient. Slowly, the greenery will give way to more concrete till the city is unrecognisable to those who grew up in it decades ago. And with the challenge of climate change, more roads and cars with less green cover is really a case of pouring oil on fire.

At one level the problem is not just about outdated notions. They are also vanity projects for our ruling elite. In Islamabad, for instance, at one level the rapidity with which construction takes place is about ‘Shehbaz speed’ in competition with ‘Mohsin speed’. If the former built one in record time, during his previous stint, taking over land belonging to a university, the current interior minister has to be faster and more efficient. He is now busy transforming the

city and who can stop him? Education, land rights, city character, the discomfort of the poor who are forced to be pedestrians, are all irrelevant issues.

With this approach, is there any surprise that CDA officials went ahead and chopped down trees ruthlessly in different parts of the city? At one place it was to build a road to a new DHA phase; at another it was to help allergy patients. Who will ask questions about who profited from the wood, or the road to yet another housing society? In this environment, very few. Accountability has no role in this age of authoritarianism. And some years from now, when the air in Islamabad is as toxic as in Lahore, and the skies just as grey as the concrete covering the city, everyone will wring their hands, and blame the richer countries for climate change. Most of those who laid down this concrete in the shape of roads and housing societies (and profited from it) will be living in lands elsewhere.

With the sleeves rolled up

The world is in ferment as the US lurches dangerously to the extreme right. Europe too has discarded a long cultivated democratic pretence and is eyeing its chance in the melee. Hungary, Poland, Austria and Italy have been singled out by Donald Trump’s strategists, according to their leaked documents, to subvert democracy for a right-wing takeover in Trump’s footsteps. British, French and German establishments are nudging their countries also towards militarism. EU is targeting Russia, Palestine and Iran even as Nato looks poised to implode in the chaos of Trump’s claims over Greenland. The EU seeks to humour Trump over Venezuela while retaining a different yardstick to judge Vladimir Putin’s advances in Ukraine.

But the masses are retaliating. Venezuela and Mexico are staging massive rallies with sleeves rolled up to combat Trump’s threat to them. Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney, sensing enough was enough of his neighbour, is mending his country’s ties with China. He could be visiting Beijing shortly to counter

the ultimatums to Canada’s economy.

Ideally, this is the time for the left to be initiating and, where possible, spearheading mass movements against the rightward slide. Jeremy Corbyn recently unfurled the flag with a separate party to challenge the British establishment, which includes his former Labour Party colleagues who he watched with dismay removing the last stitch of morality by abetting Benjamin Netanyahu’s genocide in Gaza.

French left leader Jean-Luc Mélenchon is leading a mass upsurge against Emmanuel Macron and the EU, accusing European leaders of “prostrate servility” to Trump. Mélenchon homed in on President Emmanuel Macron’s ideas on sending troops and long-range weapons to Ukraine. He demanded referendums in Donbass, Crimea and all contested regions because “it’s the people who decide” rather than warmongering elites who “don’t give a damn about people’s lives”.

The left in the US is punching above its weight to hold its ground, using every chink in Trump’s

armour to put up a promising fight for democracy. In the absence of trustworthy support from the mainstream media, YouTube channels are abuzz with analysts and activists keeping Trump in their crosshairs. A white woman activist raging against MAGA’s nativism was murdered by Trump’s hired guns from ICE. The killing in Minneapolis has set off a prairie fire across states. In the absence of vocal criticism of Trump from the Congress, the left, increasingly joined by Jewish students and senior scholars, is intervening strategically to ensure that Trump gets his comeuppance in the November mid-term polls and thereby can be reined in from doing further damage. Regardless of the outcome the left won’t be accused of sitting on its hands when America was dismembering democracy.

Brazil and Colombia have slammed Trump’s abduction of a fellow Latin American president from his home in Caracas. Trump’s toolkit for Iran is different. A colour revolution is being quelled, says Pepe Escobar, a well-regarded Brazilian observer of the Middle East. Regard-

less of the images posted in Western media, Escobar says the Iranian leadership is braced for another round of war with US and Israel, only this time better prepared. It is a testament to the feckless ways of the left that a group like Mujahideen-i-Khalq, which was instrumental in deposing the Shah of Iran, has become a catspaw for Israeli and US intrusion in its own country. Veteran Iran watchers are sanguine that without the organisational skills and a well-oiled machinery of the deeply camouflaged Mujahideen-i-Khalq, Reza Pahlavi, the former crown prince would have no standing with the rioters.

The Gulf has also been jolted by the events in Venezuela. “We are entering an era where international guarantees are fragile, institutions are weakened and power speaks louder than principle. Awareness today is not a luxury; it is a requirement for survival,” cautioned Saudi Arabia’s Arab News. It stressed that the seizure of Russian funds in Western banks was a betrayal of crucial trust that the world took for granted. “The lesson

is clear. The time to act is now.” Interestingly, the writer in the Saudi paper is prominent UAE businessman Khalaf Ahmad Al-Habtoor. It says something for the thread that still unifies the two countries despite their recent aloofness.

South Asia is inevitably deeply affected by the turn of events unfolding at breakneck speed in the Middle East and in Latin America. Pakistan, currently in the good books of Trump (for no palpable reason), has spoken out boldly on the heist in Venezuela, with its defence minister reportedly calling for the abduction of Israel’s Benjamin Netanyahu by the US (instead of Nicolás Maduro who should be freed). Bangladesh has witnessed street protests for Nicolás Maduro.

However, India, once a champion of lost causes in the Global South has been slow poisoned into becoming a basket case by its leaders seeking anchor in the West. When George W. Bush was in bad odour right across the world, a PÉW survey said India was the rare country where Bush was popular.

What does that say about the current leadership? Pulverised as a stag caught in the headlights of an approaching truck, Prime Minister Narendra Modi has left his foreign policy to the tender care of hope and prayer. What excites him, however, is any lurking campaign to win another state election, or even a municipal poll, preferably by communally polarising voters.

Modi’s calendar this year perhaps captures the essence of his preferences and fears. To cheer him, assembly polls are due in opposition-ruled West Bengal, Kerala and Tamil Nadu in May.

On the other hand, he is to host the BRICS summit around August, which comes with the terror of having to take an unequivocal stand on Trump’s thuggery and India’s one-sided love with the US. In the meantime, China, Russia and Iran began a week of joint naval exercises in South Africa’s waters on Saturday. The ‘BRICS Plus operation’ would “ensure the safety of shipping and maritime economic activities”. The sleeves have been rolled up, mostly.

Biggest conglomerate

Pakistan’s economy is often described as private-sector led. In practice, the state remains the country’s most influential ‘business group’. It owns major listed companies, dominates markets together with military welfare foundations, extracts liquidity, shields firms behind tariffs, subsidises inputs, and guarantees returns. The outcome is not a competitive market economy, but one that rewards access to the state over productivity.

Ownership that shapes outcomes: Several of Pakistan’s largest listed firms are directly state-controlled, including oil and gas producers, state-owned banks, utilities and telecoms. Alongside these sit major commercial enterprises controlled by military welfare foundations, notably in fertiliser, cement and banking. Together, state-owned or military-controlled companies account for roughly a quarter of the KSE-100’s free-float market capitalisation. This alone gives the state outsized influence over capital allocation, index performance, lending preferences and policy attention. But ownership tells only part of the story.

Control without ownership: Even where firms are privately owned, the state often shapes profitability through patronage rather than competition. Preferential access to bank credit, administered pricing, subsidised energy inputs, tariff protection and guaranteed return contracts all create economic rents. Entire sectors operate not on market discovery, but on policy-determined margins and risk transfer to the sovereign balance sheet. In such an environ-

ment, rational firms optimise for proximity to power rather than efficiency or innovation.

Where the profits really come from? The distortion is most visible in corporate earnings. Using recent aggregated KSE-100 profitability, total index profits are estimated at around Rs1.3 trillion. Of this, about 35-40 per cent is earned by companies that are directly state-owned or controlled, including oil and gas producers, state banks, utilities and military-run enterprises. The state’s footprint extends much further when one looks beyond ownership to policy-rent-exposed sectors, even where ownership is private.

If one groups together sectors whose business models are materially shaped by state policy — rather than open competition — the picture becomes starker: banks whose profits are dominated by lending to government; oil and gas exploration operating under administered pricing and concession regimes; fertiliser benefiting from subsidised or priority gas allocation; power generation and related infrastructure operating on guaranteed-return or assured-offtake contracts; and auto assemblers and parts of chemicals protected by high import tariffs.

Taken together, these sectors account for roughly 70-75pc of total KSE-100 profits. This is a measure of how much of Pakistan’s listed corporate earnings sit in sectors where state policy is a first-order determinant of margins, volumes, risk or cashflows. In other words, most profits generated by Pakistan’s largest companies are not the outcome of unfettered competition, but of state-shaped economics.

The cost to competition: This structure produces predictable distortions. Capital is misallocated towards protected or policy-favoured sectors rather than those capable of driving productivity, exports or technological upgrading. The state becomes both referee and player, compromising regulatory neutrality. And private firms, faced with state-backed incumbents and policy uncertainty, choose the safer route: serve the protected domestic market, lobby for concessions, and avoid global competition. Over time, this produces exactly what Pakistan exhibits today: weak innovation, limited scale-up, a narrow export base, and a business culture conditioned to seek protection rather than compete.

The real reform choice: Weaning the economy off state dominance is politically difficult. Patronage creates constituencies and guaranteed-return structures provide investors illusive comfort, as the IPPs discovered.

Pakistan does not need ideology; it needs consistency: separation of the state’s role as regulator and owner, time-bound reduction in tariffs and discretionary subsidies, competitive neutrality in credit, and a gradual exit from guaranteed-return business models.

Until then, the private sector will remain cautious and under-scaled — not because it lacks ambition, but because the rules reward dependence.

Pakistan’s biggest conglomerate is not listed under a single name. It is called the state — and it continues to crowd out the private sector by thwarting competition and impeding growth.

Misogyny’s polite face

According to ILO, women globally hold around 30 per cent of senior and middle management positions, rising to 35-40pc in many advanced economies. But Pakistan ranks among the worst performers. Women occupy less than 8pc of senior and middle management roles, placing the country alongside Afghanistan and Yemen at the bottom of global rankings. Even compared to other Muslim-majority countries, the gap is stark: Brunei reports 32.1pc, the UAE 23.5pc, Tunisia 26pc, and Türkiye 19.1pc. These figures reflect the lived reality of Pakistan’s workplaces, where women’s presence is increasingly visible but their authority remains marginal.

Misogyny in Pakistan’s workplaces has many faces. In traditional environments, it is loud and unapologetic: ‘Yeh kaam aurat nahi kar sakti’ (women can’t do this work) or ‘aurat ka kaam ghar sambhalna hai’ (women’s place is the home). Women are mocked, and their ambition is dismissed. In more polished institutions, misogyny is subtler. It cloaks itself in the language of progress and inclusion. Women are applauded on Women’s Day, and showcased as symbols of modernity. Yet while they are invited to the table, they are steered towards its edges. This misogyny does not shout; it smiles — while ensuring that authority and strategy remain male domains.

At first glance, gender equality in such environments appears convincing. But over time, the fine print becomes visible. In meetings, regardless of how many men are present, it is usually a woman who is politely

asked to take notes, circulate minutes, or draft follow-up emails. This invisible office housework is rarely assigned to male colleagues. Framed as helpfulness rather than hierarchy, its cumulative effect is powerful: women are positioned as facilitators, not decision-makers. Women’s ideas face a similar fate. A suggestion offered by a woman is often met with silence. Minutes later, when a male colleague repeats the same point, it is received with enthusiasm. The idea gains legitimacy only after passing through a male voice.

Over time, clear patterns emerge. Administrative coordination, compliance work and routine management tasks gravitate towards women, while strategic decisions — growth plans, financial strategy, mergers and long-term vision — remain male preserves. When these strategies succeed, credit accrues to male leadership. When they fail, women are often pushed forward — not to lead recovery, but to manage the fallout and absorb blame. Their presence becomes part of an organisation’s PR strategy: women as symbols of inclusivity, as buffers against criticism.

As a result, women are disproportionately clustered in front-facing roles — human resources, customer service, corporate communications — positions emblematic of visibility and emotional labour rather than authority. Even when women rise, another ceiling often awaits them. Promotions depend on informal male networks where loyalty is prized over leadership. The unspoken test is not competence but compliance: will she align unquestioningly with existing power structures?

Achievement, too, is narrated differently. A man’s success is attributed to intelligence and leader-

ship. A woman’s success is often explained away as networking or favour. Her failures — even those rooted in decisions she did not make — are personalised and amplified. The result is a workplace where women are present everywhere except where power is exercised.

This form of misogyny is particularly difficult to challenge because it is polite and persistent. No one explicitly says women do not belong. Instead, they are quietly confined to roles smaller than their capacity, their authority diluted through practices that appear neutral but are deeply gendered. But they matter profoundly. They shape leadership pipelines, determine who is seen as a strategist, and decide who is invited into rooms where futures are shaped. ILO statistics merely quantify what countless professional women experience daily: visibility without authority. Addressing white-collar misogyny requires more than gender-sensitisation workshops or Women’s Day celebrations. It demands structural change. Office housework must be redistributed and made rotational. Women’s achievements must be recognised without reducing them to ‘soft skills’. Decision-making spaces must be audited: who is present when strategy is discussed, and who is absent? Inclusion must occur before decisions are made, not after.

Pakistan can’t afford to sideline half its population. The cost is not only moral but economic. The International Growth Centre estimates that closing gender gaps could raise Pakistan’s GDP by up to 30pc. Until white-collar misogyny is dismantled, Women’s Day flowers will continue to wilt long before they reach the boardroom.

Devolution vital for democratic trust, effective governance: Gilani

ISLAMABAD (APP): Acting President and Chairman of the Senate Syed Yousaf Raza Gilani on Wednesday underscored that devolution was not a threat to national cohesion but one of its strongest safeguards, stressing that a confident federation empowered its constituent units while remaining united by shared constitutional values.

Addressing the concluding session of Islamabad Devolution Summit, Acting President Gilani said authority exercised closer to the people deepened democratic participation, addressed grievances at an early stage and strengthened trust in democratic institutions.

He said the two-day forum brought together parliamentarians, constitutional experts, public administrators, economists, and representatives of civil society to engage in serious and structured reflection on one of the most consequential questions confronting

Pakistan today: how to make devolution durable, functional, and truly responsive to the needs of our citizens.

He reaffirmed the Senate's commitment to advancing cooperative federalism, provincial equity and effective devolution, describing the upper house as a guardian of constitutional balance and a forum for dialogue among federating units.

Reflecting on Pakistan's constitutional evolution, the acting president recalled that devolution had been central to his political journey, particularly during his tenure as prime minister when the 18th Constitutional Amendment was enacted through rare political consensus. The amendment, he said, fundamentally rebalanced the federation by restoring parliamentary supremacy, strengthening provincial autonomy and constitutionally entrenching decentralisation.

He noted that the abo-

lition of the Concurrent Legislative List and the transfer of key subjects — including education, health, agriculture, labour and social welfare — to the provinces marked a decisive shift from centralised control to shared governance. To manage this transition, an implementation commission was constituted under Article 270AA to supervise and coordinate the transfer of subjects and institutions, underscoring that devolution was a continuous constitutional process rather than a one-time legislative act.

Yousaf Raza Gilani emphasised that constitutional authority without fiscal capacity remained incomplete, pointing to the Seventh National Finance Commission Award as an essential companion to the 18th Amendment. By revising the vertical and horizontal distribution of resources, he said, the award aligned responsibilities with revenues, a cornerstone of effective federalism.

of Sessions Judge Nasir Javed Rana. It may be mentioned here that Judge Nasir Javed had delivered the verdict in the 190 million pound NAB case.

Osama Hanif's lawyer Riaz Hanif Rahi appeared in the court and argued that there was a writ petition against the judge and there was an order of the Supreme Court. He read out the Supreme Court's decision and said that the notification of the appointment of Judge Nasir Javed Rana was issued under the jurisdiction of the Islamabad High Court. The judge was appointed here for three years but he is still performing his duties here.

Minister says: Ziarat Hassan Shah Island to be made eco-tourism hub

KARACHI (INP): Federal Minister for Maritime Affairs Junaid Anwar Chaudhry on Wednesday announced to develop the island of Ziarat Pir Hassan Shah, near Karachi, into an eco-tourism hub. "A comprehensive eco-friendly, sports and lifestyle tourism project will be introduced for the island off the Karachi Coast," minister said.

The minister said that billions of rupees investment is expected to attract over the Ziarat Pir Hassan Shah Island project. "Over Rs one billion will be spent

on the island's development", Junaid Anwar said. "The island will be connected to Karachi's District East by road." An easy access, would create job opportunities and promote the local economy, minister said. He assured that the coastal environment would be protected in the development plan. The coastal belt of the country will be transformed into economic engine. "Ziarat Pir Hassan Shah Island will prove to be a new example of blue economy," maritime affairs minister added.

Punjab govt to provide monthly stipends to parents of underage children

LAHORE (INP): The Punjab government has announced a major step to tackle child labour by deciding to provide monthly stipends to parents of underage children, aiming to pull them out of work and put them back into classrooms.

According to official details, parents of children below 18 years of age will receive conditional cash support if they stop their children from working. Once financial assistance is provided, the children will

be enrolled in education and skill development programmes so they can learn and grow instead of earning at an early age.

To make the plan work on the ground, the Punjab government will set up special task committees and prepare a comprehensive strategy to eliminate child labour. Recommendations have also been sought to amend the existing child labour laws to make them more effective and up to date. The committees have been assigned more than 20

tasks, including digital mapping and geo-tagging of working children. A dedicated helpline and rehabilitation centres will also be established to support affected children and their families. Under a socio-economic survey, eligible parents will receive a monthly stipend, which officials say will help families make ends meet without relying on child labour. The government believes this initiative could be a game changer in breaking the cycle of poverty and exploitation.

NAB reviews recovery, resumption of state land

LAHORE (APP): A meeting held at the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) Lahore office on Wednesday reviewed progress on retrieval of illegally occupied state land across Punjab and finalized a future roadmap for restoration of such land to government ownership.

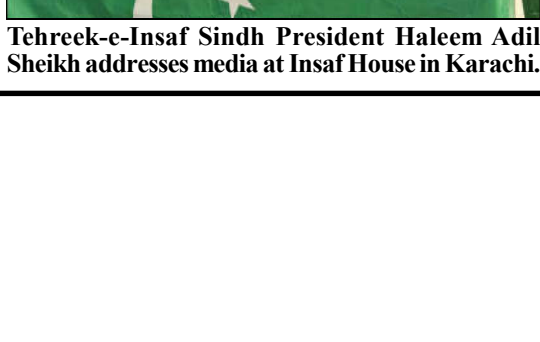
The meeting was jointly presided over by NAB Deputy Chairman Sohail Nasir and Chief Secretary Punjab Zahid Akhtar Zaman. Senior officials in attendance included Senior Member Board of Revenue (SMBR) Nabeel Javed, Prosecutor General Accountability Syed Ehtisham Qadir, NAB Lahore Director General Mirza Faran Baig, Advocate General Punjab Muhammad Amjad Pervaiz, Member Colonies BOR, DG Operations NAB Amjad Majeed Aulakh and DG NAB Multan Asim Lodhi. Commissioners of Lahore, Faisalabad, Multan, Sargodha and Bahawalpur divisions, along with senior NAB officers, also participated.

The meeting was briefed that the consolidated status of state land recovered, mutated in favour of the government and identified for resumption has reached approximately 15,667,577 kanals, carrying an estimated market value of Rs 4.37 trillion.

It was noted that, as a result of NAB's coordinated efforts and robust enforcement strategy, a substantial volume of state land has been successfully retrieved from illegal occupants across Punjab. IRSA releases 34,900 cusecs water

ISLAMABAD (INP): Indus River System Authority (IRSA) on Wednesday released 34,900 cusecs of water from various rim stations with inflow of 38,200 cusecs.

According to the data released by IRSA, the water level in the River Indus at Tarbela Dam stood at 1492.00 feet which was 90.00 feet higher than the dead level of 1402.00 feet. Water inflow and outflow in the dam were recorded as 17,900 cusecs each.

The water level in the Jhelum River at Mangla Dam was 1200.45 feet, which was 150.45 feet higher than its dead level of 1,050 feet.

10 flights cancelled at Lahore, Karachi airports

KARACHI (INP): Dense fog in and around Lahore's Allama Iqbal International Airport on Wednesday led to the cancellation of five incoming and outgoing flights while six flights were delayed for hours.

Two Jeddah-bound flights of Saudi Airline, SV-738 and SV-739, were cancelled.

Airblue's flight, PA-410, heading from Lahore to Dubai, and the airline's another flight, PA-411, heading from Dubai to Lahore, were cancelled.

Similarly, EY-284, Etihad Airways flight from Abu Dhabi to Lahore, was cancelled as well.

Likewise, Airblue's flight, PA-473, heading from Jeddah to Lahore, was delayed by four hours and 15 minutes, while Saudi Airline's flight, SV-734, also heading from Jeddah to Lahore, was delayed by one hour and 20 minutes.

Five flights were cancelled at Karachi's Jinnah International Airport due to different reasons.

Speakers call for urgent urban reforms as Pakistan's cities expand rapidly

ISLAMABAD (APP): Speakers at a seminar hosted by the Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE) on Wednesday underscored the urgent need for comprehensive urban reforms, warning that Pakistan's rapidly growing cities are outpacing the development of essential infrastructure and services. The seminar, titled "Infrastructural Imbalances Amid Rapid Urbanization in Pakistan," was held at A.R. Kemal Hall and brought together leading experts to discuss the challenges and opportunities arising from rapid urban growth, said a news release.

Opening the discussion, Dr M. Shafaat Nawaz, RASTA Fellow and Fulbright PhD from the University of Illinois Chicago, presented a rethinking of Pakistan's urbanization narrative. He challenged the conventional perception that Pakistan's urbanization is a gradual process, suggesting that the nation may already be highly urbanized, with 88% of the population living in urbanized areas, according to a recent study by the World Bank.

He highlighted the mismatch between the urban reality and the official urbanization statistics, which suggest only 39% of the population is urban. This discrepancy has led to significant infrastructural imbalances, exacerbating issues such as housing shortages, water scarcity, traffic congestion, and waste accumulation.

FM Aurangzeb admits some companies quitting Pakistan due to high taxes, expensive energy

ISLAMABAD (INP): Federal Minister for Finance and Revenue Senator Mohammad Aurangzeb has said that the government is fully aware of the challenges facing the economy, admitting that some companies are leaving the country due to high taxes and expensive energy.

Addressing the Pakistan Policy Dialogue in Islamabad on Wednesday, Senator Aurangzeb, however, said there were 20 new foreign investors who have entered the Pakistan market during the last 18 months. These new foreign investors included Google, Aramco, Wafi Energy, Turkish Petroleum and others, he added.

The finance minister also revealed that the government will hand over 24 more state units to the Privatization Commission for offloading after the successful sale of the Pakistan International Airlines (PIA).

Aurangzeb said that foreign remittances would cross \$41 billion during the

current fiscal year as compared to previous year's \$38 billion.

He said handling of tax policy has been delegated to the Finance Division as the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) is focused on collection of taxes.

Aurangzeb said the circular debt is gradually decreasing due to reforms in the energy sector.

The minister said "There are firms which are also leaving that is true... if the taxation is high or the energy cost is high or its financing cost is always moving in the right direction those have been real issues."

Aurangzeb said high taxes and high energy cost remain "real problem for businesses," adding the government has begun reforms to reduce the burden on the national exchequer and bring economic stability.

"But those firms which have been able to look at business models because it takes two to tango, what the government has to do, and what the private sector

has to do, and if you have wedged into their business models for the last 50 years it's not going to work in the New World Order," he maintained.

The minister said some of the multinational firms switched to local sourcing "because of their margins are fine and they are now able to export, therefore they stay." And If another firm has not been able to do that, then that's something we know they need to think through, he added.

Aurangzeb said structural reforms were underway across the country and that the transformation process of the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) is continuing.

"Compliance and enforcement are essential to ensure implementation of tax laws," he added.

The finance minister said over Rs1,000 billion are wasted by state units every year. "Utility Stores, PWD and PASSCO were shut down due to losses," he added.

FBR prioritizes documented economy, through reforms, digital transformation

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has placed institutional reform, digital transformation, and automation at the top of its agenda to help build a documented economy, with the ultimate objective of significantly increasing Pakistan's tax-to-GDP ratio.

Dr Najeeb Ullah, Chief Reforms and Modernization at the FBR, said that reforms and digitization are critical to achieving a documented economy, which in turn is essential for raising the tax-to-GDP ratio and ensuring long-term economic sustainability. He shared these views during an exclusive interview with APP Digital. Dr Najeeb, who is also serving as the Acting Chief of the Transformation Delivery Unit, said the unit is responsible

for overseeing and implementing the ongoing transformation process within the FBR. He noted that the institution is currently undergoing a major phase of reform, digital transformation, and automation aimed at modernizing tax administration and addressing Pakistan's persistent economic challenges.

According to the senior official, digital transformation has become the central pillar of the FBR's reform agenda. The gradual integration of process automation is fundamentally reshaping tax administration in Pakistan by replacing outdated, manual systems with automated, cloud-based platforms. These systems enable real-time monitoring, advanced data analytics, and stronger enforcement mechanisms.

PSX sheds 1,382 points to close at 182,570 points

ISLAMABAD (APP): The benchmark KSE-100 Index of the Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) on Wednesday closed bearish, losing 1,381.69 points, a negative change of 0.75 percent, to settle at 182,569.82 points compared to 183,951.51 points on the previous trading day, according to PSX data.

During the session, the ready market witnessed a trading volume of 1,034.117 million shares with a traded value of Rs 65,964 billion, against 1,037.262 million shares valuing Rs 62,705 billion in the previous session. Market capitalization declined to Rs 20,630 trillion from Rs 20,770 trillion a day earlier.

Out of 483 active companies in the ready market, 90 advanced, 352 declined, while 41 remained unchanged.

Car sales increase by 41.73% during 1HFY 2026

ISLAMABAD (APP): The sale of cars in the country witnessed an increase of 41.73 during the first half of the current fiscal year 2025-26 as compared to the corresponding half of last year.

During the July-December 2025-26, as many as 65,910 cars were sold against the sale of 46,502 units, showing growth of 41.73 percent, said Pakistan Automobile Manufacturing Association (PAMA).

Among sale of cars, Toyota Corolla and Toyota Yaris cars sale also grew by 73.57 percent from 9,633 units to 16,720 units while the sale of Honda cars witnessed a surge of 58.71 percent from 6,404 units during last year to 10,164 units during current year.

Pakistan reveal that in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, the OFC-KPK/Package-2 project has covered 800.22 kilometers, reaching districts such as Bajaur, Mohmand, Khyber, Orakzai, and others. The project has benefited 38 union councils/tehsil headquarters and involved a total expenditure of Rs2.15 billion.

In Peshawar, Nowshera, Charsadda, and Mardan, the OFC-UC-KP-LOTI 7 project has installed 756.46 kilometers of OFC, serving 78 UCs/THQs.

NEECA, Malik Group unveil roadmap for 3,000 EV charging stations

ISLAMABAD (APP): Malik Khuda Baksh, Chief Executive Officer of Malik Group of Companies, in a meeting with Additional Secretary and Managing Director of the National Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority (NEECA), Humayon Khan, unveiled the approved roadmap for establishing 3,000 electric vehicle (EV) charging stations across Pakistan.

Humayon Khan reaffirmed the authority's full institutional backing and pledged to expand the initiative to 6,000 EV charging stations nationwide.

Ambassador of the United Arab Emirates to Pakistan, Salem Mohammed Salem Al Bawab Al Zaabi, called on Federal Minister for Commerce Jam Kamal Khan at his office here, where both sides reaffirmed their commitment to deepening bilateral economic ties and expediting progress on the Pakistan-UAE Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA), said a release issued here.

Khan underscored the historical, strategic, and people-to-people bonds between Pakistan and the UAE, describing the relationship as strong and time-tested across political, defence, and social spheres. He emphasized, however,

that both countries are keen to translate this closeness into a more robust and balanced trade and investment partnership that reflects the true potential of bilateral relations.

The minister highlighted Pakistan's ongoing economic reforms and reaffirmed the government's resolve to create a more enabling environment for business and investment. DISCOs, loss-making firms to go private under 2026 plan, PM Adviser says

ISLAMABAD (APP): Adviser to the Prime Minister on Privatization Muhammad Ali said that under the government's 2026 privatization plan, the process of transferring all loss-making commercial enterprises to the private sector is moving forward, while Pakistan International Airlines is being upgraded to resume flights from April with enhanced facilities meeting international standards.

Muhammad Ali, speaking exclusively to a local media channel, said that under the government's 2026 privatization plan, six major institutions, including Pakistan Railways, ZTBL, the Roosevelt Hotel, DISCOs, and Pakistan International Airlines, have been placed on the privatization list and are scheduled to be privatized within the targeted timeline.

He added that work on the privatization process is progressing on a priority basis and emphasized that all necessary measures are being taken to ensure transparency, efficiency and

timely completion of the process in line with the government's broader reform agenda.

Talking about Pakistan International Airlines (PIA), Adviser Ali said that the bidding process for PIA also being completed and following privatization, the airline's services will be significantly improved.

He added that a CEO is being finalized and a comprehensive business plan has already been prepared.

Standards are being closely reviewed and improvements in services are underway, which passengers will witness firsthand, he said.

He confirmed that PIA will be handed over to the private sector and is expected to operate its first flight under the new management in April.

Furthermore, for DISCOs, Adviser said that five DISCOs, including Islamabad, Gujranwala and Faisalabad, are already in the advanced phase of privatization, while two other DISCOs are also being prepared for the process.

Officials told NA body 63% locomotives of Pak Railway exceeded 20 years of service

ISLAMABAD (APP): The National Assembly's Standing Committee on Railways was informed by officials that more than 63 percent of locomotives have exceeded 20 years of service, contributing to operational disruptions and delays.

The requisitioned meeting of the committee on Railways held on Wednesday to review operational challenges faced by the institution, particularly train engine failures and passenger service quality.

The meeting was presided over by Member of National Assembly, Ramesh Lal in the absence of the Committee Chairman, in accordance with sub-rule (2) of Rule 216 of the Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in the National Assembly, 2007.

During the briefing, the Committee was informed that incidents of locomotive failures have shown a slight increase compared to previous years, largely due to an aging fleet.

To address these issues, the Committee was apprised of a range of corrective measures, including improved maintenance regimes, enhanced budgetary allocations, specialized training for technical staff, procurement of quality materials through third-party inspections, and technical assistance from original equipment manufacturers (OEMs).

Plans for the overhauling and modernization of diesel-electric locomotives were also shared. The Committee was further briefed on the availability of passenger coaches.

At least 100 children killed in Gaza since ceasefire: UN

GENEVA (AFP/APP): At least 100 children have been killed by Israeli airstrikes and ground forces in Gaza since the start of a tenuous ceasefire three months ago, the United Nations said.

The UN children's agency UNICEF said that at least 60 boys and 40 girls had been killed in the Israeli-occupied Palestinian territory since early October.

"More than 100 children have been killed in Gaza since the ceasefire," UNICEF spokesman James Elder told reporters in Geneva.

"That's roughly a girl or a boy killed here every day during a ceasefire," he said, speaking from Gaza City.

"These children are killed from airstrikes, drone strikes, including suicide drones. They're killed from tank shelling. They're killed from live ammunition. They're killed by quadcopters.

"We are at 100 — no doubt," he said, adding that

the true number was likely higher.

"A ceasefire that slows the bombs is progress but one that still buries children is not enough."

AFP has sought a response from the Israeli military.

An official at Gaza's health ministry, which maintains casualty records, has reported a higher figure of 165 children killed during the tenuous ceasefire, out of a total 442 fatalities.

"Additionally, seven children have died from exposure to cold since the beginning of this year," Zaher Al-Wahidi, Director of the Computer Department at the Ministry of Health, told AFP.

Elder stressed that the ongoing Israeli attacks came after more than two years of war which has "left life for Gaza's children unimaginably hard".

"They still live in fear. The psychological damage remains untreated, and it's becoming deeper and harder to heal the longer this goes

on," he said.

In November, authorities in Gaza said more than 70,000 people had been killed there since the beginning of the war waged by Israel in response to Hamas's October 7, 2023, attack on Israel.

Nearly 80 percent of buildings in Gaza have been destroyed or damaged in the relentless air and ground offensive, according to UN data.

On January 1, Israel suspended 37 international aid agencies from accessing the Gaza Strip, despite what the UN said at the time was an "outrageous" move.

"Blocking international NGOs, blocking any humanitarian aid... that means blocking life-saving assistance," Elder stressed on Monday.

While UNICEF had managed to significantly increase aid entering the densely populated strip since October, he stressed: "You need partners on the ground, and it (the aid) still doesn't meet the need."

Furious farmers roll hundreds of tractors into Paris in fresh protests

PARIS (AFP/APP): Around 350 tractors rolled into Paris, driving down the Champs-Elysees avenue and setting up camp near the parliament building, as farmers protested a litany of woes including a trade deal the European Union has struck with four South American countries.

The protests reflect a deep sense of malaise afflicting France's agricultural sector, with the planned signing of an accord between the European Union and the Mercosur bloc seen as the last straw.

French farmers have complained of climate and economic uncertainties and have since December staged protests and set up roadblocks over the government's handling of a lumpy skin disease out-

break.

"We're at the end of our tether," said one of the activists, Guillaume Moret, 56.

"We haven't made any money from our farms for three years. Politicians are incapable of giving us any direction," said the head of the FNSEA union for the region of Ile-de-France around Paris.

The FNSEA, France's leading agricultural union, and another union, Jeunes Agriculteurs, are demanding "concrete and immediate action" from the government.

Arriving from towns around Paris but also from the Hauts-de-France region of northern France, the protesters parked their tractors not far from parliament's lower house, the National Assembly, in central Paris.

Greece airspace shutdown exposes badly outdated systems

ATHENS (AFP/APP): A deeply embarrassing systems failure which forced Greece to close its airspace for several hours with pilots unable to speak to air traffic control, has exposed badly outdated communication systems at Athens International Airport—one of the world's top travel destinations.

Flights had to be diverted to neighbouring countries with thousands of travellers hit after the "unprecedented" technical malfunction on January 4, which baffled experts.

Even more than a week after the chaos, questions as to what sparked the glitch—and how the system returned online—remain unanswered, with a report expected this week.

According to the Greek civil aviation authority, the YPA, the malfunction began at 8:59 am (0659

GMT) when multiple radio frequencies serving Athens airspace were hit by continuous "noise" interference.

The agency's transmitters began sending out "involuntary signal emissions," YPA said.

As technicians raced to radio relay stations on top of mountains near Athens and further afield to locate the problem, planes were essentially flying blind, experts said—unable to communicate with air traffic controllers—until the incident began to gradually abate four hours later.

"Hundreds of flights were directly affected—those in contact with air traffic control or already in the air that changed their route," Foivos Kaperonis, a board member of the Greek air traffic controllers association (EEEK), told AFP.

Sudan 'lost all sources of revenue' in the war: finance minister to AFP

PORT SUDAN (AFP/APP): Widespread destruction, massive military spending and plummeting oil and gold revenues have left Sudan's economy in "very difficult times", army-aligned finance minister Gibril Ibrahim said, nearly three years into the army's war with rival paramilitary forces.

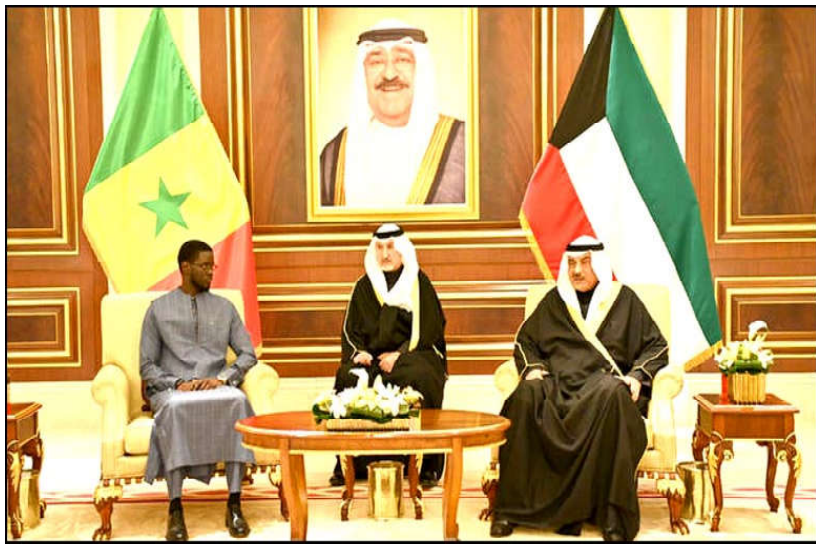
In an interview with AFP from his office in Port Sudan, Ibrahim said the government is eyeing deals for Red Sea ports and private investment to help rebuild infrastructure.

This week, Sudan's prime minister announced the government's official return to Khartoum, recaptured last year, but Ibrahim's ministry is among those yet to fully return.

British parents to get guidance on limiting screen time for children under 5

ANKARA (WAM/APP): Parents of children under 5 in the UK will soon receive official guidance on limiting screen time following new government research that links excessive use to delayed language development. Education Secretary Bridget Phillipson said the recommendations will be published in April and shaped "with parents, not dictated to them," according to ITV News. "By age two, almost all children—around 98%—are watching screens such as mobiles, tablets, and TV every day, during a critical period for language development," Phillipson wrote in The Sunday Times, citing reports that some children struggle to converse or concentrate when starting nursery or school.

According to government findings, toddlers with around five hours of screen time daily learn "significantly" fewer words.

UN warns powerful storm worsens humanitarian crisis in Gaza

UNITED NATIONS (APP): The humanitarian crisis across the Gaza Strip remains extremely serious, with harsh winter weather threatening to reverse recent gains in aid delivery, according to the United Nations. Briefing correspondents at UN Headquarters in New York, Spokesperson Stephane Dujarric reported that ongoing rainstorms are damaging and destroying fragile shelters, leaving large numbers of displaced people exposed to the cold.

"To help address im-

mense shelter needs, during the past week our partners delivered supplies to 28,000 families, including 1,600 tents, 16,000 tarpaulins and 27,000 blankets," Dujarric said.

Despite these efforts, at least 1.1 million people still urgently need assistance as weather conditions continue to deteriorate. A new storm on Friday once again battered makeshift tents, leaving thousands without protection. UN teams and partners are conducting assessments and supporting the most vulnerable, but aid workers stress

that tents are only a temporary measure. More durable solutions are urgently required, including tool kits, cement and heavy machinery to clear debris, alongside sustained funding to allow a transition from emergency relief to early recovery, Dujarric added. Children remain among the hardest hit. Health partners reported that another infant has reportedly died from hypothermia, bringing the total number of reported deaths to four, all of them very young children, according to figures from the Ministry of Health.

Denmark, Greenland officials to meet Vance, Rubio

COPENHAGEN (AFP/APP): Denmark's foreign minister said that he and his Greenlandic counterpart would meet with US Vice President JD Vance and Secretary of State Marco Rubio at the White House on Wednesday.

US President Donald Trump has been talking up the idea of buying or annexing the Arctic territory for years, and further stoked tensions on Sunday by saying that the United States would take the territory "one way or the other".

Danish Foreign Minister Lars Lokke Rasmussen told reporters in Copenhagen that he and

his Greenlandic counterpart Vivian Motzfeldt had requested a meeting with Rubio, and Vance had asked to "take part in that meeting and will host it."

"Our reason for requesting the meeting has been to move the entire discussion... into a meeting room, where you can look each other in the eye and talk through these issues," Lokke said following a foreign policy meeting in Denmark's parliament. Meanwhile Danish Defence Minister Troels Lund Poulsen said he would be meeting with NATO's Secretary General Mark Rutte on Monday to discuss Arctic security.

Syrian army tells Kurdish forces to withdraw from area east of Aleppo city

ALEPPO (AFP/APP): Syria's army told Kurdish forces on Tuesday to withdraw from an area they control east of Aleppo after dislodging fighters from two neighbourhoods in the city in deadly clashes last week.

The move raises fresh concerns of further fighting between the two sides, as Syria's Islamist government seeks to extend its authority across the country and progress stalls on integrating the Kurds' de facto autonomous administration and forces into the central government.

Ugandan opposition denounces 'military state' ahead of election

KAMPALA (AFP/APP): As dark clouds gathered overhead, young and old members of Uganda's long-enbattled opposition gathered for prayers at the home of an imprisoned politician—the mood both defiant and bleak.

The mayor of Kampala, Erias Lukwago, told the gathering on Sunday that this week's election was a "face off" between ordinary Ugandans and President Yoweri Museveni.

"All of you are in two categories: political prisoners and potential political prisoners," he said.

Museveni is widely expected to extend his 40-year rule of the east African country in Thursday's election, thanks to his near-total control of the state and security apparatus. The 81-year-old came to power as a bush fighter in the 1980s and has maintained a militarised control over the country, brutally cracking down on challengers.

Chinese, Uzbek archaeologists discover ancient city walls in Uzbekistan

ZHENGZHOU (Xinhua/APP): Chinese and Uzbek archaeologists have found early city walls constructed and modified between the 3rd century BC and the 10th century AD at the ancient city of Kuva in Uzbekistan, shedding new light on the history of a key Silk Road settlement. Located in the Fergana Valley in eastern Uzbekistan, the Kuva site, now spanning about 110,000 square meters, used to be a very important hub on the ancient Silk Road. Its historical connection to China dates back over two millennia, as it is believed to have been part of the ancient state of Dayuan, recorded by Chinese envoy Zhang Qian during the Han Dy-

nasty (202 BC-220 AD).

A joint team from the Luoyang Institute of Archaeology in central China's Henan Province and Uzbekistan's Fergana State University has been conducting fieldwork at the Kuva site since 2023. Liu Bin, leader of the Chinese team, said remains of a palace, city gates, walls, house foundations, streets and workshops have been identified. In 2025, the team focused on excavating the northern gate and the adjacent moat area. The team determined that the walls had undergone multiple modifications in terms of layout and function, using both adobes and mud bricks as building materials.

Germany plays down threat of US invading Greenland

WASHINGTON (AFP/APP): Germany's top diplomat played down the risk of a US attack on Greenland, despite President Donald Trump's repeated threats to seize the Danish autonomous territory. Trump has been talking up the idea of buying or annexing the Arctic territory for years, and further stoked tensions this week by saying that the United States would take the territory "one way or the other."

When asked about a unilateral military move by Trump, German Foreign Minister Johann Wadephul said he had "no indication that this is being seriously considered." "I believe there is a common interest in addressing the security issues that arise in the Arc-

tic region, and that we should and will do so," Wadephul told reporters after a meeting with US Secretary of State Marco Rubio. NATO is in the process of developing "more concrete plans on this" that will be discussed with US partners, Wadephul added.

It comes ahead of talks this week in Washington between Rubio and top diplomats from Denmark and Greenland. Greenland's government repeated on Monday that it would not accept a US takeover under "any circumstance." Members of US congress also issued a statement Monday saying a delegation will visit Copenhagen on Friday and Saturday, en route to the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland.

Russia strikes power plant, kills four in Ukraine barrage

KHARKIV (AFP/APP): Russia battered Ukraine with more than two dozen missiles and hundreds of drones, killing four people and pummeling another power plant, piling more pressure on Ukraine's brittle energy system.

An AFP journalist in the eastern Kharkiv region, where four people were killed, saw firefighters battling a fire at a postal hub and rescue workers helping survivors by lamp light in freezing temperatures.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said "several hundred thousand" households near Kyiv were without power after the strikes, and again called on allies to bolster his country's air defence systems.

"The world can respond to this Russian terror with new assistance packages for Ukraine," President Volodymyr Zelensky wrote on social media. "Russia must come

to learn that cold will not help it win the war," he added. Authorities in Kyiv and the surrounding region rolled out emergency power cuts in the hours after the attack, saying freezing temperatures were complicating their work.

DTEK, Ukraine's largest energy provider, said Russian forces had struck one of its power plants, saying it was the eighth such attack since October.

The operator did not reveal which of its plants was struck, but said Russia had attacked its power plants over 220 times since Moscow invaded Ukraine in 2022. Moscow has pummelled Ukraine with daily drone and missile barrages in recent months, targeting energy infrastructure and cutting power and heating in the frigid height of winter.

The Ukrainian air force said that Tuesday's bombardment included 25 missiles and 293 drones.

UN demands independent probe into woman's killing by US immigration officer

GENEVA (AFP/APP): The United Nations demanded a swift and independent investigation after a federal immigration officer fatally shot a protester in the US city of Minneapolis last week.

The UN rights office voiced deep concern at the killing of 37-year-old Renee Nicole Good, who was shot dead in her car by an Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agent in the Midwestern city last Wednesday.

"Under international human rights law, the intentional use of lethal force is only permissible as a measure of last resort against an individual representing an imminent threat to life," UN rights office spokesman Jeremy Laurence told reporters in Geneva.

"We take note of the FBI investigation and insist on the need for prompt, independent and transparent investigation into the killing," he said.

Laurence also urged "all authorities to take mea-

sures to deescalate tensions and refrain from incitement to violence".

Good's killing has sparked widespread anger at the use of force in the Trump administration's immigration crackdown, sparking nationwide protests.

The Trump administration has sought to paint Good as a "domestic terrorist", vigorously insisting the agent who fatally shot her was acting in self-defence.

This narrative is strongly disputed by local officials, who say footage shows Good's vehicle turning away from the agent and did not pose a threat to his life.

Protesters have demanded a full investigation into the circumstances of the deadly encounter.

Democratic officials are particularly critical of the fact that local authorities have been excluded from the investigation, which is being conducted by the FBI.

Cold winter and AI boom pushed US emissions increase in 2025

WASHINGTON (AFP/APP): Greenhouse gas emissions in the United States rose last year, snapping a two-year streak of declines as cold winter temperatures drove demand for heating fuel and the AI boom led to a surge in power generation, a think tank said Tuesday.

The 2.4 percent increase in the world's largest economy came as President Donald Trump and Republicans in Congress enacted a series of policies hostile to climate action, though the authors of the Rhodium Group report said the full impact of those decisions will only be felt in the coming years.

Rich nations, including Europe's largest economies Germany and France, are slowing the pace of planet-warming gas reductions even as global temperatures continue to soar, with 2025 set to be confirmed as the third-hottest year on record.

US emissions fell in 2024 by 0.5 percent and in 2023 by 3.5 percent, after the economy rebounded

from the Covid pandemic and emissions rose in both 2021 and 2022, by 6.3 percent and 1.2 percent respectively.

Building emissions rose 6.8 percent, followed by the power sector where emissions increased by 3.8 percent, the report found.

"Weather is bumpy year-to-year—we tend to see building emissions bump around like this due to higher fuel use for heating," Rhodium Group analyst and the report's co-author Michael Gaffney told AFP.

"But in the power sector this is about growing significant demand from data centers, cryptocurrency mining operations and other large load customers," he added.

Compounding matters, high natural gas prices driven by heating demand and increasing liquefied natural gas (LNG) exports allowed a comeback for coal, the "dirtiest" fossil fuel, which accounted for 13 percent more electricity generation than in 2024.

PM seeks effective recommendations to evaluate performance of federal secretaries, officers

ISLAMABAD (APP): Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Wednesday, directed to formulate comprehensive and effective recommendations to evaluate the performance of federal secretaries, emphasizing that recognition and appreciation of officers demonstrating good performance were essential for the overall improvement of the civil services.

Chairing a meeting to review proposed civil services reforms and recommendations for a performance evaluation system in ministries, the prime minister said reforms were indispensable to align Pakistan's civil service with international standards and global best practices.

He instructed the relevant committee to finalize evolutionary yet effective

and comprehensive reform recommendations for the national civil service at the earliest.

He further directed that recommendations be prepared for a system linking promotions, financial benefits, and other facilities to a comprehensive performance evaluation of officers.

The prime minister said the objective of civil service reforms was to ensure visible improvement in the lives of the people through effective public service delivery and provision of facilities.

He added that comprehensive civil service reforms aimed at economic prosperity, social harmony, development, and progress were among the government's top priorities.

The prime minister directed that meaningful consultations be held with stakeholders from the civil administration, all services, and cadres as part of the proposed civil service reforms.

He noted that the civil service was the backbone of governance and public welfare in any country.

The prime minister further directed that special recommendations be formulated to align officers' performance and competencies with contemporary requirements and global standards.

He said the committee established for civil service reforms should propose practical and sustainable recommendations that should also be capable of ensuring effective public facilitation.

Gilani underscores education diplomacy, calls for deeper academic ties with University of London

ISLAMABAD (APP): Acting President Syed Yousaf Raza Gilani on Wednesday described education diplomacy as one of the most enduring instruments of international engagement amid stressing sustained academic partnerships beneficial for the country to address deep-rooted challenges in its education sector and prepare its youth for a rapidly changing world.

Addressing a reception hosted in honour of a visiting delegation of the University of London and its alumnus, the acting president Gillani said the presence of the delegation symbolised a bridge of knowledge, aspiration and partnership between Pakistan and the United Kingdom. He paid tribute to the University of London's global standing and its nearly two centuries of contribution to human progress across disciplines.

Acting President Gilani noted that many distinguished Pakistanis were alumni of the University of London and had gone on to excel in public service, law, medicine, academia, business and diplomacy. This shared academic heritage, he said, formed the bedrock of bilateral educational cooperation and provided a strong basis for expanding ties.

He said the University's international programmes and recognised teaching centres had enabled thousands of Pakistani students to access world-class education without leaving the country. "This had helped democratise learning and allowed young Pakistanis to compete globally while remaining rooted at home," he added.

The acting president underlined that the country stood at a critical juncture in its educational development. Despite the resolve of its people and educators, he said the sector continued to face structural problems, including a large number of out-of-school children, gender disparities and regional inequalities that disproportionately affected girls and rural areas.

Govt slashes industrial power tariffs, cuts cross subsidy by Rs123bn

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Power Division on Wednesday said that the government has achieved a substantial reduction in the industrial cross-subsidy burden and electricity tariffs through wide-ranging reforms, aimed at enhancing industrial competitiveness and easing pressure on consumers.

In a statement, the Power Division said that the industrial cross-subsidy burden had been reduced from Rs 225 billion (Rs 8.9 per unit in March 2024, when the present government assumed office, to Rs 102 billion (Rs 4.02 per unit) at present, reflecting a significant reduction

of Rs 123 billion. The statement further said that industrial electricity tariffs, including taxes, declined from Rs 62.99 per unit in March 2024 to Rs 46.31 per unit by December 2025, while the national average tariff reduced from Rs. 53.04 to Rs. 42.27.

The Power Division said that to further reduce electricity prices, the government terminated inefficient power plants and successfully renegotiated contracts with Independent Power Producers (IPPs), resulting in tariff relief. It added that negotiations with remaining IPPs were continuing to secure additional reductions.

Ji to launch referendum on Punjab local government law from Jan 15: Hafiz Naeem

ISLAMABAD (APP): Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) Pakistan will launch a four-day public referendum from Thursday (January 15) to gauge public opinion on the Punjab Local Government Act, JI Emir Hafiz Naeem ur Rehman announced on Wednesday.

Addressing a press conference in Islamabad, Hafiz Naeem ur Rehman said that an independent and transparent referendum process had been arranged under the supervision of autonomous referendum commissions at central and district levels. He said that millions of people would participate in the exercise, after which a schedule for surrounding the Punjab Assembly would be announced in the light of public opinion.

He said the referendum would continue for four days, with camps set up at intersections, markets, educational institutions and other public places across Punjab. According to him, the printing of ballot papers has been completed, and all arrangements have been finalised to ensure transparency.

Rejecting the Islamabad Local Government Ordinance, the JI chief demanded its immediate withdrawal and called for local government elections in the federal capital according to the previously announced schedule of February 15.

Quetta residents' gas shortages highlighted in national party protest

QUETTA (ANN): In the midst of severe winter, the National Party (NP) staged a protest in Quetta to highlight the persistent gas shortages affecting residents, particularly in Hazara Town, Mariabad, and Saryab, where gas supply has reportedly become almost non-existent.

Addressing the protest, Provincial General Secretary Chingiz Hai Baloch Advocate, Dr. Ramzan Hazara, and other political and social leaders criticized the Sui Southern Gas Company (SSGC) for what they called unjust treatment of the public. They emphasized that the lack of gas in harsh winter conditions has made life

miserable for ordinary citizens, especially children, and demanded immediate action to restore supplies.

The NP leadership warned that if the company failed to ensure continuous gas supply in Quetta, the party would escalate the protest movement across Balochistan, stressing that the public cannot be left at the mercy of the company during extreme cold.

During the protest, SSGC General Manager Raheel Malik contacted the NP leaders for dialogue. Subsequently, a three-member committee comprising Chingiz Hai Baloch, Dr. Ramzan Hazara, and Ayaz Ali Kashtmand held formal negotiations.

FCCP to issue appropriate order in Arshad Sharif murder case: Justice Amir Farooq

ISLAMABAD (APP): The Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan (FCCP) has indicated that it may conclude proceedings in the suo motu case concerning the murder of renowned journalist Arshad Sharif.

The hearing was conducted on Wednesday by Justice Amir Farooq.

During the proceedings, Justice Amir Farooq remarked that the investigation process had been considerably slow, though the court did not wish to cast blame on any individual or institution. He added that the court would issue an appropriate order in the matter.

Counsel for Arshad Sharif's widow informed the court that a commission had been constituted on the basis of the suo motu notice, and the investigation was still ongoing. Justice Amir Farooq inquired about progress in Kenya. The counsel responded that the

Kenyan court had ruled in their favour, declaring the incident a murder instead of an accident and directing a formal investigation. However, no practical progress had been made in Kenya so far.

The counsel further stated that they approached the court to ensure the Government of Pakistan stood with the family, but there appeared to be a gap between the government's position and their expectations.

Additional Attorney General Aamir Rehman told the court that the JIT report had already been submitted. He said Kenya initially declined to cooperate in the investigation, but Pakistan and Kenya concluded a Mutual Legal Assistance (MLA) agreement in September last year. He added that once Kenya grants permission, the Pakistani team will visit the crime scene.

Pakistan, Kyrgyzstan to host Kyrgyz Cultural Day in Islamabad

ISLAMABAD (INP): Pakistan and Kyrgyzstan have agreed to organize Kyrgyz Cultural Day in Islamabad later this year, marking a significant step toward strengthening cultural diplomacy and expanding people-to-people contacts between the two friendly countries.

The understanding was reached during a meeting between Federal Minister for National Heritage and Culture, Aurangzeb Khan Khichi, and Ambassador of the Kyrgyz Republic to Pakistan, Kylychbek Sultan, who called on the minister at the National Heritage and Culture Division on Wednesday. Pak urges KSA to extend Hajj quota as per country's Population: Sardar Yousuf

ISLAMABAD (APP): Federal Minister for Religious Affairs Sardar Muhammad Yousaf has said that the government is in contact with Saudi authorities to seek an increase in Pakistan's Hajj quota to 230,000 in line with the country's population.

"With the increase in quotas for other countries, Pakistan's quota will also be significantly enhanced,"

the minister said, expressing hope while addressing a Hajj rituals training workshop and talking to media on Wednesday at the Hajj Complex. Sardar Yousaf said the Ministry of Religious Affairs is actively pursuing the inclusion of Lahore station in the dual-immigration system like Islamabad and Karachi to provide maximum facilitation to Hajj pilgrims.

Finance Dept releases Rs. 2.25b for Health Card Program

QUETTA (APP): Balochistan Finance Department has released Rs 2.25 billion for the Health Card Program.

Finance Department source on Wednesday said that the Balochistan Health Card Program (BHCP) issued by the Balochistan government to provide free medical treatment to poor and deserving patients.

The source said that the BHCP had stopped treating patients under the Balochistan Health Card in private hospitals in Karachi after the State Life Insurance became indebted to Rs 5 billion. He mentioned that after the news was published, Balochistan Chief Minister Mir Sarfraz Bugti took notice of the non-release of money and issued orders to release the money immediately.

PPP unhappy with federal govt over lack of consultation on legislation

ISLAMABAD (INP): The Pakistan People's Party (PPP) is 'unhappy' with the federal government for not taking the party into confidence over legislation.

As per details, the PPP has decided to condition its support for government legislation on prior consultation and formal engagement, sources said. The party is expected to convey its reservations to the government over being excluded from the law-making process and will demand to be

taken into confidence before any proposed legislation is brought before parliament.

According to sources, the PPP will seek detailed briefings on the agenda of upcoming joint parliamentary sittings and insist on consultations ahead of the introduction of key bills.

Party leaders have made it clear that, in the absence of meaningful consultation, the PPP will not extend support to government-sponsored legislation in either the National Assembly or a joint session.
